

#### **How to write the best answer in UPSC Mains Exam:**

- 1. Firstly, you need to have a clear understanding of what the question is asking you to do.
- 2. Identify the 'directive words, which instruct you how to answer the question. It is the most significant step in producing your answer.
- 3. Brain storming Jot down the relevant points that will form part of your answer.
- 4. Arrange the points in the order of importance. Side heading may be given.
- 5. Introduction, main, conclusion

#### a) Introduction

- It should include a few general statements about the subject to provide a
  background to your answer and to attract the reader's attention. It should
  try to explain why you are writing the essay. It may include a definition of
  terms in the context of the essay etc.
- It should introduce the central idea or the main purpose of the writing.

#### b) Conclusion

• It should recall the issues raised in the introduction and draw together the points made in the main body, and explain the overall significance of the conclusion. What general points can be drawn from the essay answer as a whole?

- 1. Flow chart, Map, Diagram etc can be placed in your answer.
- 2. As far as possible include examples recent policy measures Current Update
- 3. 'Captions' Taken from Government Advertisement (or) speeches of Ministries (*Eg*) "Minimum Government, Maximum Government".
- 4. Innovative Answers or suggestions wherever asked.
- 5. Strictly follow your word limits.
